## **Collaborative Practices in Schools with Educational Teams**

Speech-language Pathologists (SLPs) are essential members of educational teams in schools, engaging in collaborations to support students' access to the curriculum. The chart below highlights the different types of collaborative teams that SLPs participate in within schools. Interprofessional practice and education (IPP/IPE) amplifies the benefits of collaboration among team members from different professions focused on learning about, from, and with others to improve students' outcomes within the educational setting.
