Dear Dr. Adams:

On behalf of the American Speech-Language-Hearing Association, I write to thank you for your call to action to expand the use of telehealth during the Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) pandemic.

The American Speech-Language-Hearing Association (ASHA) is the national professional, scientific, and credentialing association for 211,000 members and affiliates who are audiologists; speech-language pathologists; speech, language, and hearing scientists; audiology and speech-language pathology support personnel; and students.

As the association that represents both audiologists and speech-language pathologists (SLPs), ASHA strongly agrees with you about the importance of providers utilizing telehealth to ensure that individuals with communication disorders continue to obtain the services they require during the pandemic. Since the pandemic began and stay-at-home orders have been issued, an increasing number of audiologists and SLPs have been furnishing medically necessary services within their scope of practice via telehealth when clinically appropriate for the patient. In fact, Medicaid, TRICARE, and commercial insurance have expanded access to telehealth services for more than 100 million Americans requiring audiology and speech-language pathology services. Thirty-three states have in place permanent laws allowing audiologists and SLPs to perform services via telehealth. In addition, 26 states have put into place emergency temporary laws for the provision of telehealth as a specific response to COVID-19.¹ Your leadership will help ensure that these gains are maintained and expanded over the course of the pandemic and beyond.


