STANDARD VI: MAINTENANCE OF CERTIFICATION Demonstration of continued professional development is mandated for maintenance of the Certificate of Clinical Competence (CCC) in Audiology. The renewal period will be three (3) years. This standard will apply to all certificate holders, regardless of the date of initial certification.	STANDARD V: MAINTENANCE OF CERTIFICATION Individuals holding certification must demonstrate (1) continuing professional development, including 1 hour of continuing educations in ethics; (2) adherence to the ASHA Code of Ethics; and (3) payment of annual dues and fees.	Standard V now states that, of the 30 hours of continuing professional development that must be completed every 3 years, 1 hour must be in ethics.
Implementation: Once certification is awarded, maintenance of that certification is dependent upon accumulation of the requisite professional development hours every three years. Payment of annual dues and/or certification fees is also a requirement of certification maintenance. A certificate holder whose dues and/or fees are in arrears on August 31 will have allowed their certification to expire on that date. Individuals who hold the CCC in Audiology must accumulate 30 contact hours of professional development over the 3-year period and must submit a compliance form in order to meet this standard. Individuals will be subject to random review of their professional development activities.	Implementation: Individuals who hold the CCC-A must accumulate and report 30 certification maintenance hours (CMHs) (or 3.0 ASHA CEUs) of professional development, which must include 1 CMH (or 0.1 ASHA CEU) in ethics over each 3-year certification maintenance interval. Individuals will be subject to random audits of their professional development activities. Individuals who hold the CCC-A must adhere to the ASHA Code of Ethics ("Code"). Any violation of the Code may result in professional discipline by the ASHA Board of Ethics and/or the CFCC.	The new Standard V requirement of 1 hour of continued education in ethics provides assurance that the certificate holder's knowledge of ethical practices stays current. Implementation language has been revised in Standard V to include that ASHA conducts random audits of professional development activities in order to ensure that individuals holding the CCC-A have completed the required number of hours during each certification maintenance interval. This is directly related to the practice of audiology.
If certification maintenance requirements are not met, certification will lapse. Reinstatement of certification will be required, and certification reinstatement standards in effect at the time of submission of the reinstatement application must be met.
